I AM OC SPOTLIGHT

Kyra Nathan – community volunteer, future doctor, OC student



Kyra Nathan knew her life's path at six years old – she wanted to study medicine and work in obstetrics and gynecology. Her career path started after a conversation between Kyra and her mother: her mom told Kyra that she was going to see a “boy doctor” for an appointment. From that point on, Kyra wanted to give women the option to see a female doctor in addition to a male one. Over time, she also became more interested in the development of babies and wanted to educate women on how to take care of their bodies and their babies.

When she got older, she recognized Olympic College could prepare her to study medicine and go in to her chosen field. “I felt (OC) would help me transition into a four year university, with a strong academic foundation. Both my brother and father graduated from OC and are very successful.”

While at OC, she has already had her eye on a program at the University of Washington called Molecular, Cellular, and Development Biology and has been taking classes to prepare her for the admissions requirements. So what does Kyra do in addition to attending classes full-time at OC? She works two jobs, attends church, and volunteers in the community.

After she graduates from medical school, she plans to come back to the community where she grew up. She has lived in Kitsap her entire life and wants to give back to the community that has given so much to her.

Admissions & Registration

➔ New Student Admission

To be eligible for general admission to the college, ONE of the following is required:

- High school or GED graduation, or
- 18 years of age or older, or
- A written release from the high school district
(Usually, applicants under the age of 16 are not offered general admission.)

Fast Registration

Students who wish to register for one to six credits may register in person at their local campus registration office. For information, phone 360.475.7200 and press "0" to speak to a registration representative.

Students with previously completed degrees or professional certifications may register without required advising if prerequisites are met.

Transfer Credit

Course work at other colleges or universities may count toward degree or certificate requirements.

1. Register and attend class.
2. Fill out and submit the "Request for Advance Standing" form (available at any college campus or at www.olympic.edu/Students/GettingStarted/recregforms)
3. Submit official college transcripts to Registration and Records.

Military & Veteran Applicants

Running Start Applicants

High school juniors and seniors who wish to enroll in Running Start (RS) classes at Bremerton, Poulsbo or Shelton campuses should follow directions in the RS application packet available in high school counseling centers, from the college or online at www.olympic.edu/runningstart. Please submit the general OC application for admission, take the college assessment and then submit the separate RS application together with a copy of the assessment scores and high school transcripts (minimum 2.5 GPA).

All admitted RS students must attend a RS orientation and meet with both a high school counselor and college RS advisor prior to registration. Students register for winter classes in December.

New Student Assessment and Advising

What is an assessment?

New students are required to take an assessment to enroll in English or mathematics classes. A computerized assessment is used to assess sentence skills, reading comprehension, and mathematics skills.

Students who have attended college elsewhere may not be required to take the assessment if they have a 2.0 grade level or higher in college level English or college level algebra. Please see an educational advisor in the Student Entry and Advising Center for evaluation of college level English courses. Please contact the Science/Engineering/Math Advisor for placement into college level math courses.

Special accommodations

How to Register:

1 Meet with a faculty advisor

- **Fewer than 15 completed credits.** To register for seven or more credits, an advisor's signature is required. Ask the advisor for your PIN to register online (see OASIS).
- **15 or more completed credits.** Faculty advising is strongly recommended but not required. Use your global PIN to register.
- **Running Start and International Students** must meet with their advisor each quarter prior to registration, select courses, and receive their quarterly PIN and entry codes.

2 Find your "Time to Register" on OASIS and plan your class schedule.

3 Register online at www.olympic.edu/OASIS

- Click on "Register or add/drop a class"
- Log in: Enter SID (860XXXXXX)
- Enter registration PIN as your birth date (50179 if May, 1979) or your global PIN if you changed it, or a special PIN number given to you by your advisor.
- Click on "Continue"
- Enter item numbers of class selections
- Click on "Submit add/drop" (Your new class schedule will appear on the screen)
- Click on "Finish"

Entry Code Special Permission

Entry codes may be obtained from your advisor and expire after one use. The code provides a way for you to register online or in person for: (a) a class that requires instructor permission, or (b) a class that has a prerequisite block.

Prerequisite Block

Some classes require completion of a prerequisite. See class listings for specific prerequisites. Also see "What is an assessment?" for more information on English and mathematics prerequisites. If the prerequisite was completed at another college/university, present the appropriate transcript to the faculty or Student Entry and Advising Center advisor to obtain permission to enroll.

Residency Requirements

To be eligible to pay resident tuition, a student must be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident, who:

- Is financially independent AND
- Has established a domicile in Washington state for other than educational purposes for a period of at least 12 months prior to the start date of the quarter OR
- Is a dependent student whose parents or legal guardians have maintained a domicile in Washington state for at least 12 months prior to the start date of the quarter AND
- Who further meets and complies with the applicable requirements of WAC 250-18-030 and 250-18-035

SB1079. Individuals who are not permanent residents or U.S. citizens MAY qualify for resident tuition, if they have or will have graduated from a Washington state high school or, while living in Washington, have received the equivalent of a high school diploma. Additional criteria are required. Contact the Admissions Office for more information.

Military personnel stationed in Washington State and their dependents who present military ID at registration will be granted a waiver of non-resident tuition and will be charged at the resident rate.

Restrictions

If your schedule contains a restriction, the class or wait list may be removed from your schedule. Restrictions are:

- **Course conflicts.** You cannot wait list for a class that has the same discipline and course number.
- **Time conflict.** You cannot wait list a class if the time conflicts with an enrolled class. This restriction includes overlapping start and end times.
- **Limit of three** wait lists for any quarter.

Time to Register

Students register at or after their assigned "Time to Register," which is based on the number of credits completed plus officially transferred credits listed on the student's OC transcript.

- **Continuing students:** Look on OASIS for the time to register
- **Former students:** Contact Registration and Records to be assigned a time.
- **Running Start students:** Contact the Running Start Office.
- **New students:** Register in person following your new student advising session. Contact the Student Entry and Advising Center at 360.475.7230. *If registering for fewer than 7 credits, register in person after the start of new student registration.*

Wait List

If a desired class is full, please add your name to the wait list. If an opening occurs, your name will be added automatically (overnight) to the class list. Check your OASIS class schedule daily. If the course has been added, tuition is due within two business days. If a wait list reaches a sufficient number, another section may be added; lab sections may not be exactly as listed.

➔ Financial Aid

The Olympic College Financial Aid Office processes applications for federal, state, and institutional financial assistance. Students interested in financial aid must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and enroll in an eligible degree or certificate program in order to be considered for grants, work study, and/or loans.

Be sure to check the Financial Aid web page for eligible programs and intent codes at www.olympic.edu/FinancialAid. If you are a new student requesting financial aid for winter quarter, complete the FAFSA, the OC online Application for Admission at <https://admissions.occ.edu/applicant/welcome.cfm> and the Program and Intent Code form.

Fee Information

All students in credit classes are charged these fees once each quarter and summer session:

Student Service: \$1/credit (maximum \$10)
Technology Fee: \$3.50/credit (maximum \$35)

Exempted from these fees are students who are eligible for the Fallen Veterans waiver, apprentice trade theory courses, zero-credit contract training, continuing education, and adult basic education (ABE).

Security Enhancement fee: \$20

Exempted from these fees are OC off-campus classes in Kitsap and Mason counties and ABE/ESL classes.

Testing fees

- Accuplacer: \$15 (non-refundable); test retakes: \$15
- GED test series: \$75; test retakes: \$15
- Proctor test fee: \$25

Other fees

- WAOL fee: \$8/credit
- Telecourse fee: \$30 (optional VHS telecourse tape rental fee: \$35)
- Adult Basic Education: \$25
- USB fee: \$8

Class Fees

- **IN PERSON:** At the Bremerton Cashier's Office, Shelton Main office and Poulsbo Student Services office. We accept check, money order, cash, personal checks for the exact amount of tuition and fees, Visa, Mastercard or debit card.

NOTE: Active duty students may be eligible to use military tuition assistance to pay for classes. For details, see an on-base academic advisor.

Tuition Payment Plan - STEPP (Student Tuition Easy Payment Plan)

- A tuition payment plan is available to students. The program has new criteria effective Winter Quarter 2010: Students on STEPP will be required to put down 34% of the total amount of tuition and fees at the time of enrollment in the plan. At the end of the third week of the quarter, an additional 33% of total tuition and fees is due. The final 33% payment is due at the end of the sixth week of the quarter. A \$10 non-refundable application fee is required. Additional information about STEPP can be found on our website at www.olympic.edu/Students/Tuition/stepp.

Payment Deadlines

- **Winter registration payment is due within two business days of registration.**

NOTE: Olympic College will cancel the registration of students who do not pay tuition and fees. Students who wish to re-register for classes may do so online or in person, with payment due within two business days.

I-BEST Classes

INTEGRATED BASIC EDUCATION AND SKILLS TRAINING (I-BEST)

I-BEST programs combine college-level professional-technical certificates with English language and basic skills instruction. Students have two teachers in each class. One focuses on professional-technical skills, the other teaches basic skills and English language skills. Basic skills include math, reading, writing, computer skills, student success strategies, and educational/career planning. For more information, call 360.475.7408.

Prerequisite: Orientation/qualifying score on state standardized assessment.

Early Childhood Education:

A two-quarter program series of short-term certificates that focus on Early Childhood Education (ECE) practices. It prepares basic skills and English language learners for various entry level positions in ECE.

Manufacturing:

A two-quarter program providing training designed to prepare students for entry-level positions in manufacturing.

Nursing Assistant:

A two-quarter program short-term certificate that prepares individuals for the certification exam as a Nursing Assistant Certified (NAC). It prepares basic skills and English language learners for entry-level positions in health care as nursing assistants.

Welding (Shelton):

This two-quarter program provides the knowledge and skills to perform precision metal cutting with a concentration on worker and equipment safety. It prepares basic skills and English language learners for entry-level metal cutting positions in the welding industry. Completers have the option to continue in the Welding Program.

Online Courses

What is an online course?

An online course is a course that you can take using your computer and the internet.

What materials and equipment will I need?

- **Computer with internet access:** While dial-up services will allow you to access the internet, most courses are faster to access and more comfortable to take with a high-speed or broadband connection.
- **Textbook:** Most instructors require a textbook. Textbooks are available at the OC bookstore on the Bremerton campus or online at <http://ocbookstore.com>.

How do I access my online classroom?

Where can I get technical support?

- For ANGEL based courses, go to <http://angel.olympic.edu>

- For all other online courses, please contact your instructor. Instructors provide technical, access and other support for their non-ANGEL based online courses.

Telecourses

What is a telecourse?

Telecourses are VHS-based courses that combine VHS tapes of lectures and information with materials from the instructor. These materials can include study guides, assignments, examinations, and handouts. Courses are designed to be taken at home over a specified period of time with little contact between instructor and student.

What materials and equipment will I need?

- **Videos**
 - Telecourse tape rentals are available through the Distance Learning department located in the Haselwood Library at OC Bremerton. Tape rental is \$35 for the entire quarter. You must first pay the fee at the Cashier's Office then bring a receipt to pick up the videos.

- Telecourse tapes are also available on a 24-hour loan from the Haselwood Library on the Bremerton campus, or at the Johnson Library on the Shelton campus.
- Telecourse videos are also viewable on the Public Access stations for Comcast Cable (channel 12) or Wave Cable (channel 3). These are generally broadcast in the early morning hours.
- **Textbook:** Most instructors require a textbook. Textbooks are available at the OC bookstore on the Bremerton campus or online at <http://ocbookstore.com>.
- **Syllabus and Other Course Materials:** Most instructors require at least one on-campus meeting with students. This is generally an orientation that takes place at the Bremerton campus. Additional materials that students need are passed out at these sessions. Orientation times can be found at www.olympic.edu/distanceclasses.

Telecourse Fee

Each telecourse has a licensing fee of \$30 regardless of the way the videos are viewed. This fee is passed on to the video producers for the ability to use their material.

USB-Drive Courses

What is a USB-Drive course?

USB-drive courses, which were until recently called portable courses or POCO, are self-contained courses delivered on returnable USB memory stick drives. The courses are designed to provide students with little or no internet access a more interactive experience than a telecourse, but not as interactive as an online course. These courses are designed to be taken from home over a specified period of time with little or no contact between instructor and student.

What materials and equipment will I need?

- **USB Drive:**
 - USB drives are available at the appropriate division offices on the Bremerton campus or through the instructor. Please see www.olympic.edu/distanceclasses for information on where to get your USB drive.
 - Access to a Windows-based computer with a USB 2.0 slot.

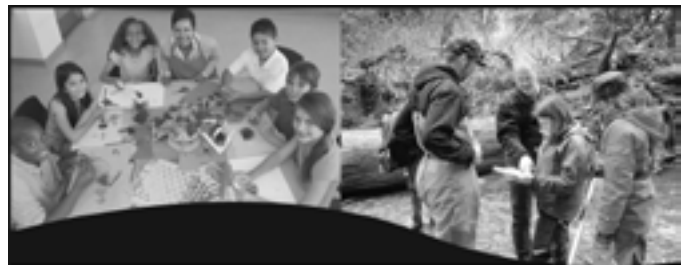

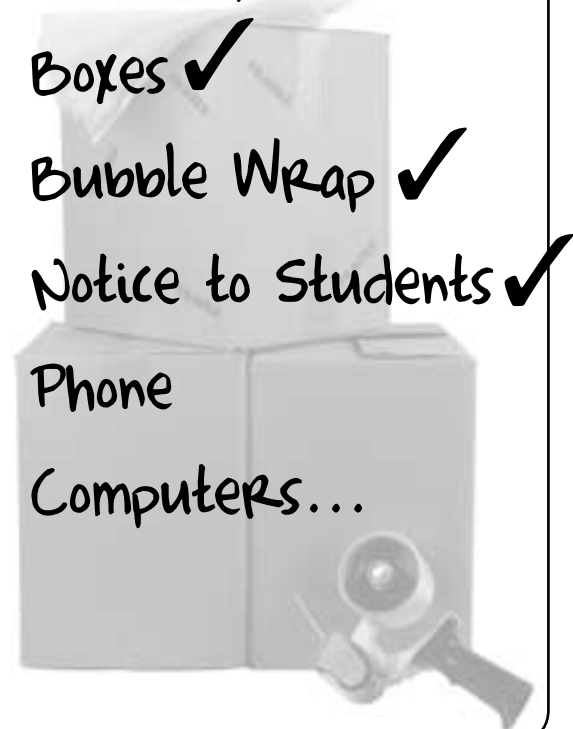

There are five student parking lots at OC Bremerton, including the lot on 11th Street between Lincoln and Ohio. The parking spaces are clearly posted and striped with WHITE paint. With the exception of handicap and carpool spaces (which are reserved and enforced 24 hours a day, seven days a week), there is open parking in all lots after 4 p.m. year round.

Permits are Required for Students and Visitors

Visitor Permits

Visitor permits can be obtained at the College Service Center at OC Bremerton or the Safety and Security Office in the Bremer Student Center at OC Bremerton.

Student Parking Permits

Student parking permits are required to park in all student lots at OC Bremerton. OC Shelton parking passes can be obtained in the main office at OC Shelton. OC Poulsbo requires a parking permit, which can be obtained at OC Poulsbo. Student permits and copies of OC parking rules and regulations are available at the Safety and Security Office at OC Bremerton. Students will need to show an Olympic College photo ID and vehicle registration to obtain a permit.

Faculty and Staff Parking

Posted faculty and staff parking lots are striped and numbered with YELLOW paint.

Handicap and Carpool Spaces

Handicap and carpool spaces are appropriately signed and available in all lots; parking in these spaces requires appropriate permits.

NOTE: Street parking adjacent to campus is controlled by the City of Bremerton and subject to all applicable city ordinances. Bicycle riders are required to honor all regulations pertaining to bicycle use and parking on campus. Olympic College reserves the right to enforce all parking regulations. The drivers of all motorized vehicles must comply.

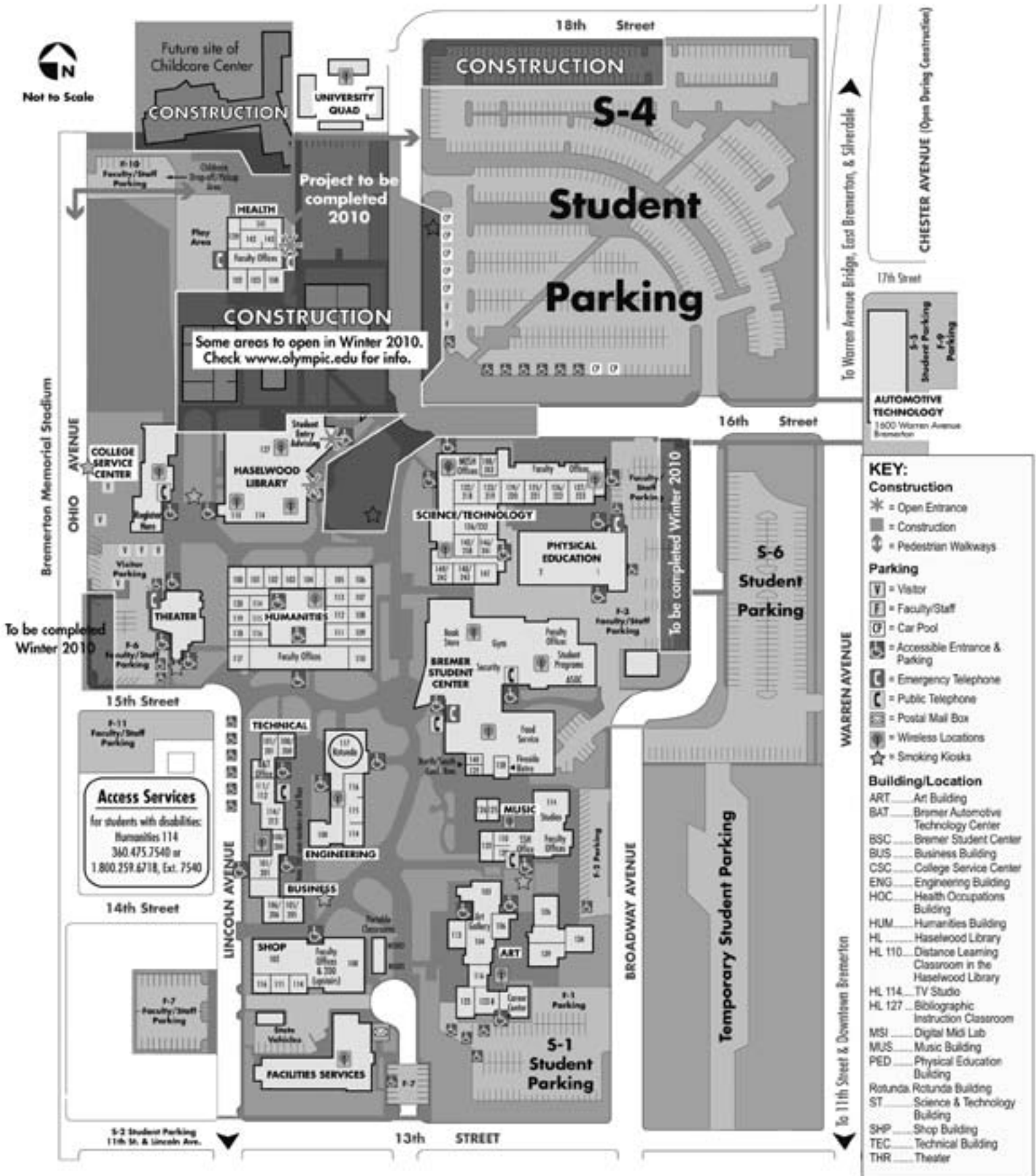

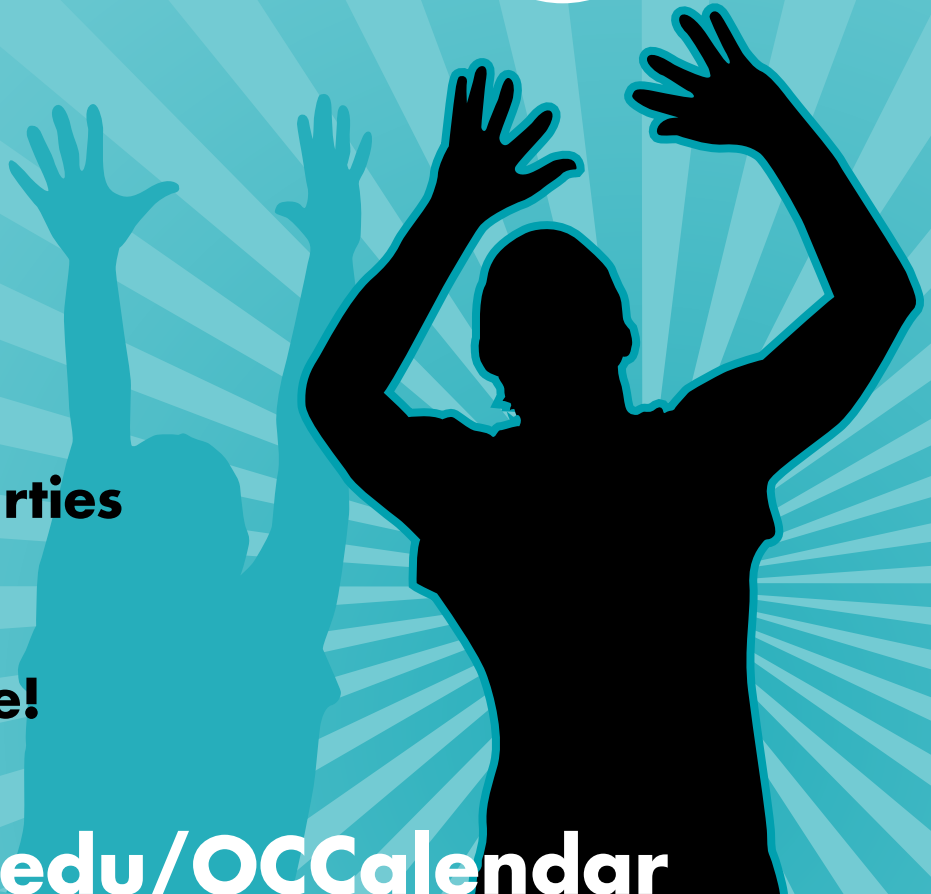
