Admissions

- Application process is separate from the application to Olympic College
- Application is due August 31st each year
- 20 students admitted each year
- Starts in January
- 4 quarters in length (done in December)
- Receive a certificate of specialization
- Qualified to take NCLEX to become licensed practical nurse

The Accuplacer

New to college?

- Take the entire Accuplacer!
 - Places you for Math and English classes
 - You many need developmental classes. Build the foundation!

Done with prerequisites?

- Take the Reading Comprehension Accuplacer!
 - <u>All</u> applicants must take the Reading Comprehension part of the Accuplacer and submit scores with their application.
 - Minimum score to apply = 260 (Next Generation Accuplacer)



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Prerequisites

Prerequisites give you the knowledge base to make sense of the nursing curriculum.

- Must be complete by August 31st
 - ENGL& 101 Composition I
 - PSYC& 100 Introduction to Psychology
 - BIOL& 241 Anatomy and Physiology I
 - BIOL& 242 Anatomy and Physiology II
- Minimum 2.0 GPA required





Required and Optional Classes

Required before you start the program

- NURSE 151 Dosage Calculations (3.7 grade required)
- NURSE 152 Intro to Pharmacology (2.2 grade required)

Required by end of 1st quarter

NURSE 118 (or NUTR& 101) – Nutrition

Optional Class

ENGL& 102 – Composition II

Transferring Credits

• Who needs to supply transcripts?

- Anyone who has attended a post-secondary institution.
- Submit directly to the Admissions office Bremerton campus or <u>evaluators@olympic.edu</u>
- You must also submit a Transcript Evaluation Request form
 - Not an automatic process!

Out of State Biology and Chemistry?

You need a course review!

 If you took Biology or Chemistry from an out of state college/university (or The Evergreen State College), the credits must be evaluated for equivalency by an Olympic College faculty member

• What's the process?

- Email Ashley at <u>ablake@olympic.edu</u>
- Provide course syllabus and unofficial transcript
- Sent to the science faculty to determine equivalency
- Allow three weeks for results



Credits from other colleges/states

Transcript Evaluation	Course Review
For the entire college	For Nursing Program only
Determines transferability for general credit at the college	 Determines equivalencies for specific Biology or Chemistry classes taken out of state or at The Evergreen State College
 Must be requested once you are registered or apply to the program 	 Can be done any time prior to application
 Official transcripts and transcript request form to <u>evaluators@Olympic.edu</u> 	 Send class syllabus and unofficial transcript to <u>ablake@olympic.edu</u>

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Other Details

Retaking a class

- OC policy is three attempts; we will take your most recent attempt
 - If it is below a 2.0, you are not eligible
- NURSE 151 (Dosage Calculations) two attempts to get 3.7 or above

Expiration of credits

For nursing, there is no expiration

Application fee

None for PN application

THE APPLICATION AND THE FACTOR SYSTEM

After you've completed prerequisites...

- Complete the PN application
 - Application may be submitted when all prerequisite courses are complete – OR – when currently attending last prerequisite course (Summer quarter)
- Include an official copy of your Accuplacer Reading Comprehension scores.
- Official transcripts from any institution after high school
- Application deadline is August 31st



The Factor system

- The factor system is points based.
- All courses must be completed by August 31st to receive points (except NURSE 151 and 152)
- Cumulative GPA of prerequisite courses
 - ENGL& 101, PSYC& 100, BIOL& 241, and BIOL& 242
 - 4 points possible depending on GPA

GPA	2.0 - 2.5	2.6 - 3.0	3.1 - 3.5	3.6 - 4.0
Points	1	2	3	4



The Factor System (continued)

- NURSE 118 (or NUTR& 101) Nutrition = 1 point
- ENGL& 102 Composition II = 1 point
- Certified Nursing Assistant License = 1 point
- Rollover (for applicants who are eligible but not accepted on their first attempt) = 1 point

1st time applicant – 7 points possible

2nd time applicant – 8 points possible

The PN Program

WHAT TO EXPECT ONCE YOU GET IN AND WHAT WE EXPECT OF YOU!

Types of classes

- One Theory Credit = 1 contact hour per week per credit
 - Lecture and class activities
 - Most classes are 3 credits, so 3 hrs./week
- One Lab Credit = 2 contact hours per week per credit
 - Practicing Skills
 - Classmates as "patients" (non-invasive!)
- One Clinical Credit = 2 contact hours per week per credit
 - In a facility like a hospital, care center
 - REAL patients!!
 - Simulations





Time Commitment

Class time

- 9 credits of theory
- 2 credits of lab
- 3 credits of clinical
- Study time
 - For each hour in class, you need about 2 hours to study





Grades

- Grade requirements
 - Minimum 2.0 for PNURS courses

- What happens if I don't achieve the required GPA (2.0) in a PNURS class?
 - The student will have the option of petitioning the faculty for reentry to the Nursing Program.
 - If a failure in a clinical course occurred due to safety concerns petition for readmission is not an option.



For clinical classes

- Students must provide evidence of the following before beginning <u>clinical</u> experiences:
 - BLS for Health Care Providers
 - Malpractice & Liability Insurance
 - Health Insurance
 - Immunizations
 - Background Inquiry

These things are NOT necessary to apply to the program. It is recommended you wait to hear if you are admitted to the program before gathering these items



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Essential Functions of a Student Nurse

 Students will be asked to perform the essential functions of a student nurse (motor, sensory, communication, cognitive, behavioral/emotional, professional conduct).

Motor duties may include:

- Sitting
- Standing
- Walking
- Lifting
- Bending
- Twisting

- Squatting
- Carrying
- Pushing
- Pulling
- Reaching
- Writing

- Typing
- Pinching
- Gripping
- Bimanual dexterity



Essential Functions of a Student Nurse (continued)

- Student nurses are responsible for communication with families, caregivers, and other staff, be it written, verbal, electronic demonstration or other media in relation to their assignment.
- Students must possess emotional health for the adequate use of intellectual abilities.
- Students must possess the ability to reason and practice nursing according to the **Professional Code of Ethics.**

<u>Reasonable accommodations</u> will be afforded to eligible student nurses with disabilities as described under federal and state laws. Contact Access Services (360-475-7540) or <u>AccessServices@Olympic.edu</u> for information on accommodations for students with disabilities.



If you accept admission to the PN Program...

- You must agree to the following conditions that <u>may</u> occur during the year in the program:
 - Attending classes during the day or evening on weekdays, and even weekends.
 - Participating in clinical experiences day, evening, or night shifts, M-F or on the weekends.
 - Traveling to clinical sites that may be over 50 miles away.
 - Making your program and clinical schedules your top priority, taking precedence over work and personal schedules.
- If you cannot commit to these, please DO NOT ACCEPT your provisional acceptance into the PN program
